## Yurts!

Enjoy the year-round comforts of a domed tent with structural support, a wood floor, lockable wooden door, lights and heating, and beds with vinyl covered mattresses. A bunk bed sleeps three, and a futon couch sleeps two. A fire ring, picnic table, and paved parking are right outside. Up to two pets (cats and/or dogs only) are allowed in the pet-friendly facilities for an additional fee.

## **Activities at the Park**

Harris Beach offers several trails to viewpoints and the beach with opportunities to see a large assortment of plants and wildlife. Junior Ranger programs open to children age 6-12 and evening campfire programs for everyone are offered throughout the summer. Check with the registration booth for current schedules and information.

## **Beach Treasures**

The southern Oregon coast is a beachcomber's paradise. Miles of sandy beaches offer opportunities to find a variety of seashells and stones. For your safety and to protect bird habitat, please avoid climbing on beach rocks.

The Harris Beach day-use area is ideally positioned for beach access and beachside picnicking with a view. The seascape includes the largest island off the Oregon coast, a formation alternately called Bird or Goat Island. The island is a National Wildlife Sanctuary, preserving a breeding site for rare birds such as the tufted puffin.

#### **More to See**

**Samuel H. Boardman State Scenic Corridor:** This 12-mile-long park along Highway 101 is a series of scenic waysides, some with picnic tables where you can sit and enjoy unparalleled ocean views. Or you can explore the park by foot via the Oregon Coast Trail. The south end of the park is only three miles north of Harris Beach.

**Boats in Brookings:** A boat launching ramp, moorage facilities, boat rentals, and charter boat service are available at the south jetty, near the mouth of the Chetco River.

**Jet boat rides:** Gold Beach, 30 miles north of Brookings, offers jet boat rides up the famous Rogue River.

**Lily bulbs:** The Brookings area produces about 75 percent of the Easter lilies grown in the United States. Vast fields bloom in early July. The bulbs are shipped all over the world.

**Additional beach access:** McVay Rock, Crissey Field, and Winchuck State Recreation Sites offer access to beaches south of Brookings. A visitor welcome center at Crissey Field has more information about things to see and do in the area.
